
AB 1550, the Climate Investments for CA Communities Act: Increased Benefits for Senate District 1

SD 1 already benefits greatly from Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund investments. AB 1550 takes the next step, benefitting over 143,000 households in the district with incomes 80% of the state median or less.

SD 1 is disproportionately impacted by poverty: Based on their incomes, over 143,000 households (40% of the district) would be eligible for benefits under AB 1550. whether or not they live in designated Disadvantaged Communities.

Available benefits include home weatherization, clean vehicle rebates, public transportation, affordable housing near transit, urban forestry, low-cost solar power and more.



SD 1 is disproportionately impacted by air pollution

SD 1 faces severe air pollution. El Dorado, Sacramento, Placer and Nevada counties are among

the country's 25 most polluted regions for ozone pollution. Plumas County received an F from the American Lung Association's 2016 State of the Air report for both short-term and annual particle pollution

Already Funded in SD 1

- \$18.9 million within the district
- \$33.4 million impacting the district
- Over 2.9 million metric tons greenhouse gas reduction

Sample GGRF-funded projects in SD 1

Truckee Railyard Downtown Corridor Improvements Project: \$8 million will help Truckee Development Associates improve mobility between historic downtown Truckee and working neighborhoods, build 60 units of affordable housing and support economic development. Projected greenhouse gas reductions: 20,079 metric tons.

Sacramento Regional Water Efficiency: \$2.5 million will help the Regional Water Authority reduce water waste in 3,100 homes in the region. The program focuses on distributing over 30,000 fixtures, saving more than 1,500 million gallons of water. Projected greenhouse gas reductions: 33,993 metric tons.

Forest Health and Legacy: 19 grants totaling nearly \$6.7 million will help protect the health of forests in the region. This includes \$1 million to the Sacramento Tree Foundation to plant 3,000 drought-tolerant trees in disadvantaged communities and \$1.5 million to the Placer County Resource Conservation District for watershed restoration and reforestation.

Residents of SD 1 also received \$2.6 million in clean vehicle rebates. Regionally, the district benefited from an additional \$14.5 million in GGRF funding, including \$6.4 million to the Sacramento Regional Transit District to refurbish 7 light rail vehicles to increase peak hour service and enable future service expansion.
